# College expands degree program offerings

The new blue and gold brochures say it all – "Get Psyched!"

Goldey-Beacom College will now offer the Bachelor of Arts in Psychology degree beginning in Fall 2010. Over the summer, the College received Department of Education and Commission on Higher Education approval to expand offerings with the new degree. Psychology will now join the College's existing degree programs in economics, computer information systems, and all areas of business.

The new degree was announced in early Fall and has generated considerable interest among potential new students. A number of students have already applied, joining some current students who have petitioned to change their major to psychology. Director of Admissions Larry Eby reports, "We are seeing strong enthusiasm among next year's freshmen about this program. Our college fairs have proven highly successful as we talk to students who may have previously bypassed business

programs in search of other majors. We are anticipating a great Fall enrollment."

The program is designed to provide a practical degree for those seeking an entry-level career in the behavioral science field as well as for those planning to pursue graduate work. According to Vice President, Dr. Gary L. Wirt, the program requires 122 to 126 credit hours of study including coursework in Social Psychology, Tests and Measurements, Abnormal Psychology, and Biological Foundations of Behavior. According to Wirt, the College has spent the past months planning library growth, selecting new databases, and refining the curriculum. He states, "The program is particularly exciting because it allows enough individualized course selection to allow students to begin to prepare for graduate study, licensure, or special credentials in their field." Wirt also points out that the program will initially be led by four faculty members with doctoral degrees in psychology, but supplemented with working professionals in the field who can bring exciting real-life experience to the classroom. Wirt emphasizes, "These faculty have published textbooks, researched in psychology, obtained counselor licensure, and worked in mental health. We're convinced our students will find a stimulating experience in our classrooms. This program is not about dry dusty theory, but about useful skills and a keen understanding of human behavior."

College President Mohammad Ilyas states, "We are extremely excited about this new initiative and know we can bring the same rigor and quality to a psychology program that we have brought to our business offerings." Ilyas stresses that the new program will benefit from the College's existing focus on accessibility, convenient scheduling, generous financial assistance, and quality instruction in that blassering the result of the new

McClelland brings extensive industry experience to his new role. Prior to Cliff Freeman, he was



# Men's Soccer Team

#### **Women's Tennis Team**

The Goldey-Beacom College women's tennis team continues to get better and better each season under Head Coach Joe Kissel. The now two-year reigning Coach of the Year guided the Lightning to their best season in the program's short five-year history this Fall. With a record of 13-2, GBC reached its first ever Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference Final. Though they fell to conference newcomer and former East Coast Conference power Concordia College (N.Y.), the Lightning accomplished a great deal just to get to that point. Along the way, they went undefeated (8-0) at their home site, the Delcastle Tennis Courts, including a regular season and conference semifinal win over perennial conference title contender Holy Family University. The conference semifinal match was the first CACC playoff match the Lightning hosted in their history, and their first-ever playoff win. And boy did they do it in dramatic fashion! The match took over five hours and two different sites (due to darkness) to complete, but the Lightning came out on top, 5-4. GBC also earned its first-ever win over CACC powerhouse Philadelphia University and Division I LaSalle University. For their success this Fall, the Lightning were ranked No. 7 in the East Region according to an ITA poll released on Nov. 6. Three Lightning players garnered conference honors: Marina Sales, Sophomore., All-CACC 2nd Team, Vanessa Leon Velasquez, Freshman, CACC Honorable Mention. Kissel earned his second straight Coach of the Year award as well.

The Goldey-Beacom College men's soccer team had a very successful 2009 season. The Lightning (6-12, 4-7 CACC) finished No. 8 and earned a berth in the Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference Tournament for the first time since winning the tournament in 2003. With the season on the line, GBC gutted out two clutch wins over Bloomfield (1-0) and Caldwell (2-1) to clinch the eighth and final spot. The Lightning would face the topseed and host, Wilmington University in the first round and lose a hard-fought game, 2-0. GBC played the nation's No. 12 ranked team to a scoreless first half, but surrendered two second-half goals as they were ousted in the first round. Senior forward Angel Rodriguez was in the top-10 in the conference for nearly every offensive statistical category, including fifth in average points per game at 1.67. Rodriguez recorded 10 goals and five assists in 15 games this season, and he was honored by the conference as an All-CACC 2<sup>nd</sup> Team Selection. Goalkeepers Ignacio Farias and Andrew Cairns also had great seasons, splitting time in goal for the Lightning this Fall. Farias, a freshman, was ranked No. 8 in goals against average (2.30) and in save percentage (.716). Junior Andrew Cairns was No. 7 in save percentage (.718) and No. 10 in saves (61). The Lightning won the most regular season games (6) and conference games (4) since 2003. Head coach Dr. Michael Finizio, since taking over in 1998, has now won 90 games in his 12-year career at GBC.

#### **Men's Cross Country Team**



The Lightning men's cross country team capped another successful season under fourth-year head coach Brian Conley. GBC was very competitive in all seven of its meets, and sent four runners to the NCAA East Regional meet in Boston. Among the highlights for the season were top-five team finishes in five of their meets, including a 2<sup>nd</sup> place finish in the 4K race at the Stevens Invitational at Liberty State Park, and a 3<sup>rd</sup> place showing out of 14 trams at the Baruch 8K Invitational at Van Cortland Park. GBC placed 9<sup>th</sup> of 10 at the conference meet this season. The Lightning were led by sophomore Ben Kinley. A Johnstown, Pa. native out of Central Cambria High School, Kinley had a sensational sophomore season for the Lightning this Fall. He led the Lightning in all of their races this season and placed in the top-10 in four meets, including a third-place finish at the Goldey-Beacom Fall Classic on Oct. 3. Kinley also ran the eighth-fastest 10K in school history at the NCAA meet when he finished in 26:55.3.

### **Women's Soccer Team**



The GBC women's soccer team finished the season with a record of 2-14. After starting the season slow, the Lightning never quit and won back-to-back games in October over non-league opponent Washington Adventist University (3-2) and Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference foe, Post University (3-1). GBC was led by sophomore forward Karin Eriksson, who tallied nine of the Lightning's 16 goals and added an assist. She also took a team-high 50 shots, putting 28 on goal. The Stockholm, Sweden native was 2-of-2 on penalty kicks. She was named to the ESPN the Magazine/CoSIDA District 2 Third All-Academic Team in November. An international business major with a 3.90 grade point average, Eriksson was among 15 players in the region selected to the Third Team. Senior midfielder Kate Attenberger also had a great season, recording eight points on two goals and four assists. She was second on the team with 44 shots. Attenberger earned a spot on the All-CACC second team for her performance this season. Sophomore Kristin Degenhardt and freshman Alyssa Vetrano split time in net for GBC this season. Degenhardt made 79 stops while allowing 33 goals, and Vetrano made 62 saves while allowing 28 goals.

#### **Women's Volleyball Team**

The Lightning volleyball team, under secondyear head coach Rich Bowers, equaled its overall and conference win total from 2008. as GBC finished 9-22 overall and 4-15 in the Central Atlantic Collegiate Conference.



Bowers' squad posted in-conference wins over Chestnut Hill College (twice), newcomer Concordia College and Felician College. Among the highlights from its conference schedule was a near victory over CACC semifinalist Dominican College and a 3-2 comeback victory on the road against Chestnut Hill College. In just the fourth match of the season, the Lightning held a 2-0 match lead over the Chargers at home in the Jones Center, but could not win a third and decisive match as they fell, 3-2. At Chestnut Hill on Sept. 17, GBC, with its back up against the wall down 2-1 in the match and losing the fourth set 24-21, fought its way back to win that fourth set and then the fifth to claim the victory. The Lightning also went 5-7 in their very competitive non-conference schedule that included four schools from the strong Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference. They were led offensively by sophomore Roni Shaner (179 kills, 213 assists and 39 service aces), graduate senior Kellyn Nolan (178 kills, 17 assists, 17 service aces) and freshman Monica Dempsey (161 kills, 404 assists, 40 service aces).



#### **Women's Cross Country Team**

The GBC women's cross country team showed vast improvement throughout the season as they completed a successful 2009 season. A very young team with just one graduating senior, the Lightning showed they will be a force to be reckoned with in the Central Atlantic Conference in years to come as they placed 11<sup>th</sup> of 14 at the conference meet. During the season, the Lightning placed 4<sup>th</sup> of seven at the Cumberland County Community College Invitational, fifth of nine at the Stevens Invitational and sixth of 12 at the Hunter Invitational. Freshman Liz Williams paced GBC all year long. Williams, from Wilmington, DE and local high school A.I. DuPont, had a very impressive rookie campaign for the Lightning this season. She was GBC's top-finisher in every meet, placing in the top-15 in five meets, including two in the top-10. At the GBC Fall Classic, she ran a 22:53, which was the fastest a GBC female runner has ever run the course at Carousel Park. She also ran the school's 11<sup>th</sup>-fastest 8K at the NCAA meet when she finished in 29:21.0.
